FINANCIAL REPORT NOVEMBER 2025

The following financial reports are attached:

- Summary Profit and loss for eight months ended 30 November 2025 against prior year and budget
- Balance Sheet as at 30 November 2025
- JBWere Monthly report Summary November 2025

Key points to note:

The Net Operating result at the end of November is \$272,195 compared to budget of \$23,693 and \$110,155 last year. The overall result, including positive Investment market movement, is \$611,632 compared to budget of \$83,693 and \$382,391 this time last year.

Income

- a) The JB Were investment portfolio income YTD is \$354,982 compared to budget of \$160k and \$163k last year.
- b) VCA and ACA Affiliation fees are in line budget.
- c) ACA Courts hire is lower than budget due partly to timing in billing and partly to lower numbers in some tournaments.
- d) The unrealised gain on the Investment portfolio YTD is \$339,436, down \$48k for the month but still much higher than expected for the year to date.

Expenses

- a) MYOB and Admin support and Committees continue to be lower than budget.
- b) YTD spend on development initiatives of \$2.1k is below budget.
- c) The webmaster expense of \$30k has been included in operating expenses as agreed by Council.
- d) Differences in other expenses are mainly due to timing.

Balance Sheet

- e) Net Assets at 30 November were \$10,054,117 compared to \$9,660,866 at November last year. The movement in Net Assets for the eight months is an increase of \$611,632.
- f) Accounts Receivable is mainly Brimbank Club contribution fees and CA Court Hire fees.
- g) See attachment for summary pages of the JB Were portfolio at 30 November showing the value of \$6,231,212 an increase of \$622k since the end of March.

Cash Outlook

The operating bank account is \$77k at month end. As approved at the last meeting we drew down \$40k from the Investment portfolio.

Other

The Finance sub-committee has not met since the last Council meeting.

President's report

BACKGROUND

Under the by-laws, the president is required to represent and promote mallet sports in all its forms throughout Victoria, to chair meetings of Council and CoM, and to attend meetings of sub-committees and working groups *ex officio*. Under the Constitution, the Committee of Management reports to Council via the President, but for the time being the Committee of Management is not meeting.

UPDATE

1. Promoting and representing mallet sports

Since my last formal report in October, I have

- Continued to press for useful information from the government GamePlan governance site. It's a concern that this is still not available.
- Attended Vicsport's monthly state sport information briefings
- Attended the Vicsport Annual General Meeting
- Attended the presentation of a Croquet Australia Hall of Fame certificate for Agnes Morrison to the Chair of MCC Croquet and the President of Elwood Croquet Club
- Attended a Vicsport workshop on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, with Treesh Reeve. We will be required to have DEI policies in place to qualify for the next round of government funding from Sport and Recreation Victoria.
- Met with the liaison team from Sport and Recreation Victoria to discuss our draft update on our Together More Active grant. Our report has now been accepted and we have received the next tranche of funding.

2. Governance

Supported the Nominations Sub-Committee in encouraging members to stand for vacant positions. As indicated in Tom's report, we are optimistic about two immediate positions, but there are other vacancies, and all appointed positions are due to be considered by Council next June. This is a continuing issue which still needs involvement from all Directors.

Worked with Treesh Reeve to prepare a summary of club responses to the 2025 Annual Club Survey (see separate report). This is a big job which it would be good to share with others.

Forwarded the Croquet Victoria mobile phone as agreed at the November Council meeting.

3. Liaising with Croquet Australia and other states

I convened the first of our Presidents' meetings with new Managing Director Chris Bannerman. We have agreed to pass round responsibility for chairing and for taking notes. Next chair will be the President Croquet Queensland, who is following up my note to Chris Bannerman with the action items from our last meeting.

I attended a meeting of Presidents at short notice to hear the background to a last minute change in the Croquet Australia Selection Policy, re-worded to enable the International Selection Committee to consider players who would not otherwise have qualified for selection in the MacRob team.

4. Attendance at meetings

Since the June meeting of Council I have attended the following meetings *ex officio*: Ad hoc GC Regionals meeting; VCC Business Plan (1), VCC subcommittee (1), Golf Croquet Selection (1), Marketing and Publicity (2), Tournaments and Fixtures (1), the Strategic Plan Implementation Sub-Committee (4), the Child Safe Sub-Committee (2), Finance (1) and the Nominations Sub-Committee (2). I also attended an update meeting re RevSport.

Under 21 Coordinator report

BACKGROUND

The task of the State Coordinator of Under 21 Croquet is to create and deliver a state program aimed at people under the age of 21 that will encourage, nurture and develop players in the sport of croquet. This paper provides a brief update on events since my last report.

UPDATE

1. Current Under 21 membership and support

Currently fourteen affiliated members from ten clubs have been registered as aged under 21, plus there is at least one affiliated junior who has not been registered as under 21.

According to this year's annual club survey, clubs in every region are engaging with schools. Thirty-one clubs reported that they were definitely running a schools program this year, and thirteen said they plan to do so. The Child Safe sub-committee is offering these clubs support via a Zoom meeting in January 2026.

2. Victorian championship

The national Gold and Silver Under 21 Medal competition has been suspended by Croquet Australia. In place of the Bronze Medal competition which was scheduled for the first weekend in December, Croquet Victoria ran the inaugural Under 21 Golf Croquet Singles Championship. Four players entered, two from Golden Square and two from Portland (formerly from Casterton). They played a Best of Three over the two days. Competition between the top two players was very tight: they went to 1:1 and entered the third game on the same handicap and index. The final game went to hoop 13. The winner was Michael McLean from Golden Square, defeating James Wombwell from Portland. Many thanks to Graham Smith for his refereeing, Pieta McLean for managing the BBQ, and all the players. Despite the low numbers it was a positive and enjoyable event.

Clubs engaging with schools were invited to encourage interested players to attend VCC for a social doubles day on Sunday 7 December. There was some interest in this but not enough for it to proceed. The possibility of such an event will be canvassed with clubs in January 2026.

3. National events

It is not yet clear whether the national Under 21 Doubles event will proceed. However, Victoria is well represented in the Under 21 Singles which will take place in Hobart in January.

4. Support for Under 21 Coordinator

I would particularly like to thank Graham Smith, who has been actively contacting clubs and families and providing support for juniors, and Pieta McLean, who has been encouraging players to participate in competition and in particular to attend the national championships. Pieta's nomination for Assistant Under 21 Coordinator is on the agenda of this Council meeting.

Assistant Coordinator Ricochet: As ricochet is still developing, the State Coordinator Ricochet (Maurice) has stated that having the Assistant role filled is not necessary at this stage.

- 3 *HSC is responsible for maintaining and developing relevant CV policies, including:*
 - *Adverse Playing Conditions (there is also a Croquet Australia version of this).*
 - *Anti-Doping Policy and VCC First Aid Policy*
- 4 *HSC is responsible for development of policies to ensure safety of Victorian Croquet Centre employees, volunteers, players and visitors.*
- 5 *HSC will not deal with matters of Child Safety which are within the scope of a separate sub-committee.*

The Health and Safety sub-committee has met twice since our September 2025 Report covering the following topics:

- **Adverse Playing Conditions policy** with consultation from Tournament & Fixtures sub-committee – The DRAFT Policy is submitted for Council approval at the December Council Meeting.
- **Croquet Australia guidance on facility safety inspections.**
It was noted the absence of Electrical Testing and Tagging, Storage on Hazard Chemical Signage, Material Data Sheets and Chemical Register.
 1. Further consultation via the October Secretaries Meeting was sought. The Health and Safety Subcommittee will write to advise Croquet Australia to update their Facility Safety Inspection Checklist for clubs.

December 2025

Numbers at Kyneton (32) and Maldon (28) remain healthy.

Kyneton is preparing for the club's 150th anniversary celebrations in 2026. Kyneton ran a Come and Try activity for school children during the July holidays, with 4 sessions run over 2 weeks. Unfortunately the Kyneton Daffodil Festival Come & Try day was cancelled due to rain. Kyneton has held social days with Golden Square, Macedon Ranges, Castlemaine and Quarry Hill. Another successful Kyneton Hi & Low Doubles Tournament was held on Friday 26 September with Ian Potter (Boort) and Lynne Breen (Golden Square) the winners. Kyneton also welcomed players from around the state to a GC Social Day on 8 October.

Maldon celebrated its centenary with social events in March and April 2025. The club's only surviving Life Member, Mrs Lillian Long attended a centenary lunch and spoke of her memories of the club. Sadly Mrs Long passed away several months later. Coaching of Maldon Primary School students was run over a 5 week period in October and November.

We have one coach and one referee. This is ample for our Club as we have not run any Tournaments or Social Days this year.

FINANCES:

Our Financial position is very stable so at this stage we have no need of any fund raising.

As we hire our courts from the Echuca Tennis Club we have no control over maintenance of the Courts. However, the Tennis Club keeps them in good condition for us.

This year we applied to the Sports and Recreation Victoria for an equipment grant and was successful in securing it. This money was used to purchase 2 sets of new balls.

SPONSORSHIP:

Our uniforms are sponsored by Moama Bowling Club and The Busy bean Coffee shop sponsors us for a weekly prize.

PENNANT AND TOURNAMENTS:

Our Pennant team was very successful last year, just getting beaten in the Grand final, however this year due to illness and lack of availability we have not been able to enter a team. Hopefully this will change for next season.

Our members attend tournaments and social days regularly at other Clubs in the region, usually with some great croquet played.

Club information:

Euroa Croquet Club was established in 1906. It has two full size courts that are maintained by club members. After floods in 2022 we lost use of the Clubhouse for over a year and members worked to get the courts back to reasonable playing condition.

Membership:

Currently our membership stands at 33 gradually increasing since 2017 where our membership had dropped to below 17.

Our game days are held weekly on a Wednesday from 9-30 am to 12 noon. A couple of years ago the club started a Social evening/come and try every Friday afternoon from around 4pm onwards with drinks and nibbles afterwards.

This has been successful and has attracted 3 young players from Argentina who were working at the local horse stud and came to join us every Friday for a while. Recently a member had a relative from New Zealand staying for 6 weeks and he attended not only our Wednesday game days but also our Friday afternoons. We have held other come and try days but our Friday afternoon seems to be the most successful in attracting people for come and try and a bit of socialisation. We have gained a couple of new members who had purchased from raffles that we have held.

Games Played.

The Club plays Golf Croquet almost exclusively, a couple of our members tried Association croquet and ricochet but there wasn't enough interest from other members to continue.

We do not have junior members but annually between 3 other clubs we hold an interschool competition. Our Euroa teams have had success in this competition.

Club issues:

The club was successful in applying for a Council grant and also an Inland Rail grant.

The club has 2 teams in the GVCA pennant tournaments and usually finish in the top 4.

In 2022, 16 members from our club made a trip to Boort Croquet Club and had a most enjoyable day with their members. We have finally been able to reciprocate and will host 11 members of the Boort Croquet Club at Euroa on 8th September 2025.

At our last meeting 20.8.2025 our financial balance was \$17,199.04.

RICH RIVER CROQUET CLUB REPORT 2025

Rich River Croquet Club has currently 55 members. Play days are Golf Croquet – Tuesday and Thursday and Association Croquet - Wednesday and Saturday. The Association Croquet numbers have increased over the past two seasons. 12 members are now playing AC regularly and 2 teams have been entered in the Pennant Competition this season. Once a month, Kingball is played, which combines techniques from both codes. Regular Come and Try Days are held over the year which bring a small number of people requesting coaching. Our coaching team of Russell Smyth, Cherie Lessing and Sandra Retallick serve the club well. Sandra has great success with Moama Grammar Students who come for coaching as part of their PE Program in June. RRCC is fortunate to have a number of qualified referees in both Golf Croquet and Association Croquet. The club has 5 courts which are maintained by the RRGC Greens Managers. Once a month, the President of RRCC and the Greens Manager RRCC meet with the Golf Club team to discuss issues and maintenance. From the end of October to the end of January, the courts will be closed for resurfacing. We are in the process of organising some trips to our regional clubs over that time. Echuca Moama Croquet Club, Deniliquin and Kyabram have kindly offered to have us visit for social play.

As mentioned above. RRCC is an integral part of the Rich River Golf Club which allows us to be included in their Newsletters and Christmas Activities. Croquet is often part of the Christmas break up for businesses in the district. In October, as part of Seniors month. a Twilight Event is held for members and friends. Recently, Lucinda. The Marketing Manager assisted with the poster for the Colours for Cancer Charity Day. The local paper – Riverine Herald has a weekly report on social play for both GC and AC plus a write up for the Pennant teams. When major events are held, a reporter and photographer will attend.

RRCC hosted a very successful Together More Active Player Development sessions from December to March. 12 players from Echuca Moama CC, Deniliquin CC and RRCC attended the sessions. All reported that they had increased their skills and confidence in their game. Many thanks to Maurice and Sarina for their time and expertise. We are really fortunate to have a range of players who are able to assist with clarification of the rules and on normal play days will often explain when obvious mistakes are made. Many of our players have Working with Children NSW registration but at this stage we do not have a Child Safe Champion.

Over the season RRCC has three major tournaments - the Association Croquet ANZAC Classic Singles, Rich River Golf Croquet Doubles and the Rich River Golf Croquet Singles. The Golf Croquet Social days are held in March and July with the Annual Charity Day held in late August. In house competitions are held over the year – The Golden Mallet where the winners of GC Singles monthly winners play over two days, The Vincent Shield is a High Low Draw for partners honouring Mae and Roy Vincent two stalwarts of the RRCC and the John Kelly Kingball Trophy played early in the year. Over the year there has been some really outstanding croquet played. Exciting to see 11 of the top national players play in the Augst GVCA AC Tournament as they prepared for the World Championships later this year. This year RRCC have two AC Pennant teams and one GC Pennant team playing in the GVCA Competition.

Finally, thanks must go to the Committee and members for their commitment to RRCC.

In 2025 we continue with the GV Fruit Bowl Tournament, and again we were able to get clubs from outside the GVCA and NEDCA, and this year's Tournament appears to have a lot of interest from around Victoria.

All Social Days have been very well attended by visiting club members, and members of our club are keen to attend other social days in the region

The Club runs 2 -3 Bunnings BBQ'S at approximately 4-month intervals for the purpose of raising funds, and in 2025 these continue with increased revenue.

We saw an increase in club membership of 9 with a loss of 4 over this time.

Again, in October our club participated in the senior's festival, which holds events held around the state. These events introduce participants to new experiences and sports to those who are interested. Most of our new members resulted from this event.

In the first half of the year the Shepparton Club hosts the year 10 students from the Grammar School, who participate over 6 weeks with two groups of approximately 20-24 students each session. Those students really enjoy their time with us (we look to the future).

Unfortunately, we were unable to continue with the interschool comp due to lack of communication between clubs involved.

The Shepparton club has 18 members with a WWCC.

We have two Golf Croquet Pennant Teams. One Golf Croquet team the Kookaburras, have reached the Grand final for 2025.

Shepparton also hosts the GVCA Champion of Champions in March.

Shepparton run 2 twilight competitions, Spring for 10 weeks , a break over the Christmas period, and Summer which is longer and moves into autumn. These are very popular competitions with members participating from around the GVCA.

Recruitment still remains mostly word of mouth, although the game is back being promoted on Win News with pennant results on a Tuesday evening. Along with regular reporting in the local paper.

Shepparton has 2 qualified umpires to assist and 1 level 1 GC coach.

The members in Shepparton are very active with volunteering when activities require with a possible 80% involvement from members.

Our court quality is excellent, thanks to our Green Keeper Bill Daunt and our Clubs greens/maintenance officer.

Shepparton has a compliant Child Safe Policy which is reviewed annually.

The Clubs running costs continue to rise and we are facing an issue with our lights as they age. It is becoming difficult to source parts and globes, these older lights cost a lot to replace and to replace the globes due to their height, is becoming prohibitive.

Total Expenditure for the maintenance of our Greens for the year ending 31st March 2025 was \$17,302. Approx. \$900 less than the year 23/24.

With an overall loss for the Club for the year of \$3407.41

Murray Valley Report to Council:

The 6 clubs in our Region are Boort, Charlton, Mildura, Red Cliffs, Swan Hill and Wycheeproof. The following are responses from each club.

Boort:

- Boort Lakeside Croquet Club has 34 members – Male: 9 Female: 25. 2 members are Association players, though all play Golf Croquet.
- We have lost two members to another club and one member has gone into care.
- The club has no juniors at this stage although the Boort Secondary College and Charlton College visit as part of their sport curriculum. Occasionally a member will bring a grandchild along and they join in on social day play.
- We have four members who have qualified as referees. As well as refereeing for tournaments, pennant, and social play they run regular coaching/information sessions
- The club is in a good financial position.
- The Croquet Courts are in excellent condition, however there is an ongoing threat of damage from our local corellas
- We have been successful in applying for grants of \$1000 to go towards new uniform jackets, Local Shire grant to the value of \$625 and a grant from the local Grain growers Co-op of \$2500 to help the club.
- We maintain a good relationship with the local council. All our members are fully engaged as Volunteers at the club. Voluntarily providing hospitality to the club and visitors, organising play, social days, tournaments and cleaning. Members are always willing to give a hand locally and committed to the local community in many aspects, however, not generally willing nor having the capacity to branch out wider.
- We have been involved with the Together More Active Player development workshops and court soil testing (as above)
- Child safe compliance. We have appointed a Child Safe Officer (Delma Pappin) and are compliant with the policy.

NOTABLE SUCCESSES:

- Events held:
 - very successful Golf Croquet (March 2025) and Association Croquet (October 2025) tournaments held
 - Pennant: Boort entered two teams in the MVCA Pennant season. The count came down to hoops and Boort White pipped Boort Blue at the post by two hoops 634 to 632.
 - Social Days with other clubs – 11 of our members travelled to Euroa to participate in a social day which was a reciprocal visit; Bendigo Croquet Club visited us on Bendigo Cup Day which has become an annual event with the two clubs alternating hosting.
 - Hosting a night of family fun and croquet for players and their families who have come to Boort for the Easter Tennis Tournament.
 - Supporting school groups from Boort and Charlton schools as part of their school sports curriculum.
- The club is going well and not requiring any help in the immediate future

Charlton:

Charlton Croquet Club continues with a steady membership of 20. We play 2 sessions a week in Association Croquet and 2 in Golf Croquet all year round with an extra session for both codes in the summer when we play under lights at evening.

- Our courts are in fairly good order with a good greenkeeper looking after them. We are holding our own financially and most of our bigger maintenance is cared for by the local shire as we are on Shire property.
- We are very active in the Murray Valley Croquet Association, joining in Round Robin Days and fielding teams in Pennant Competition. We had one team in GC this year and AC played a sort of Round Robin Day instead of Pennant because of the difficulty of some towns to field a team.
- We have a comprehensive folder of policies which are reviewed regularly and have an up to date Child Safety policy even though we don't have children playing regularly. We usually have some supervised by teachers groups of school children once or twice a year to have a bit of a try at croquet.
- We held a successful Tournament that attracted entrants from many different clubs. It was held over 2 weekends so they could accommodate numbers.
- One of our members Lindsay and his wife Naomi have been competing successfully in quite a lot of State level events. Lindsay represented Victorian in a team that played in the Eire Cup in Adelaide and won the event.

Mildura:

- Mildura Croquet Club has a membership of 34 (11 Male, and 23 Female, including 2 Under 21 Males) and only play Golf Croquet. We are happy with our membership and always have new members coming along. The club has taken the position of paying the membership of the 2 new under 21 boys, as an incentive to help them.
- **Of note:** We have Stella Barnes who has recently turned 100 and is still an active player. We would be interested to see if any other members in clubs are in this unique position.
- We have 1 x level 1 coach and 1 x level 2 coach. Financially, our club is doing well and our court quality is not to bad.
- Recruitment of players is by word of mouth and we are always open to welcome any community groups. We have a good relationship with our local council and they continue to work with us.
- We have been involved with the "Together More Active Player development workshops, court soil testing"
- Child safe compliance is always present.
- We held coaching at the club and this was a large success
- 2 Players have had some successes and numbers attending tournaments are increasing
- Our club is facing the issue of SHADE AND SMALL CLUB ROOMS
- We think clubs need to be open to help when perhaps they believe all is well in their patch.

Red Cliffs:

- We have 22 members, 17 female, 5 male. Code played is Golf Croquet.
- Our membership has increased from a year ago, with no juniors. We have a Level 1 coach and no referee. Our financial position is stable

Notable Initiatives.

- We have increased the number of game days to 2 per week, now playing on a Sunday morning as well as Thursday morning.
- The club held two sessions of how to play croquet with the Red Cliffs Secondary school early in the year. The kids that participated thought it was great fun and I think our members got a lot out of it also in showing them how to play the game.
- The club has purchased a first aid cabinet to treat minor accidents. The cabinet has been hung on the wall next to the D Fib to make it visible to everyone.
- The club at the last General meeting created a new position for a Special Events and Promotions Organiser. The club has held a raffle event to help raise funds for the club and is considering holding other events to raise the club's profile in the new year.
- Over the last few months, the club has been doing a maintenance upgrade of the equipment. New peg stands have been made and the hoops and centre pegs have been painted with new transfers. The clubs' seats and seating shelters have also been getting a new paint and repair which is almost finished. The club put on a Working Bee in which most members pitched in to help.

Development and Policy.

The Level 1 coach has put together two coaching mornings for the club members during the year, with more to take place in the new year.

Successes:

- We have not held any tournaments yet but are hoping to hold and run a Round Robin event in the new year.
- No members have been away to tournaments over the past year.

Help and Issues

- We will require help in setting up, publicising and running the Round Robin, and other future tournaments.
- A number of players have flagged an interest in learning how to play Association Croquet. If there are any coaching programmes like the golf croquet ones, Red Cliffs and Mildura would be interested in holding a combined coaching session.

Swan Hill Tennis and Croquet:

- We have 10 Female 2 Male 1 Junior Male. All can play GC but only 4 play AC.
- Gained 2 new members from another club. It looks like we will lose 2 who are unwell and unable to play. One new member joining in the new year.
- We have one junior, who does not come very often
- New male member has been a coach and referee but has let it lapse
- The Club finances are good. The club is in the process of purchasing 2 sets of quadway hoops and associated equipment requirements
- Court quality - Excellent – We are part of the Tennis club with a full-time greenskeeper
- Child safe compliance - All policies are in conjunction with tennis club

- Have come and try days etc, they seem interested but we have trouble getting them back

NOTABLE SUCCESSES:

- We hold a successful annual AC winter tournament and 2 successful GC Social days per year, and participate in the Murray Valley GC Pennant
- Lois has had success in AC and GC tournaments and Darren in local AC winter tournament

- We have a new Greenskeeper and our courts are .
- The local Shire Council and our club work well together and we have a good relationship.
- Our players are very content with their croquet and are enjoying the sport.
- Thanks to Croquet VIC, we utilised the soil testing service and received excellent advice from the “Living Turf” company.

Goldfields CA Report to Croquet Victoria Council Meeting to be held on Monday 15th December at Cairnlea

Goldfields CA Report December

Goldfields CA has had to deal with many issues in 2025, but has continued to offer many opportunities for play for members.

The death of Graeme Jones, from Maryborough, in December 2024, has deprived Goldfields of much expertise. Apart from being a quality player he was instrumental in organising the training of referees and coaches, as well as running coaching programs with Peter Martyn, and other qualified referees.

Level 1 coaching is again being offered for members, and members from other associations, in early 2026 by Peter Martyn and qualified helpers.

Castlemaine has one A-court which is used officially for GC on a Tuesday and Thursday and AC on a Wednesday. Coaching beginners regularly occurs on a Monday and a relaxed social game has begun on a Friday afternoon.

Two members have actively and enthusiastically organised some very successful PRIDE “Come and Try” days at the club with bunting, music, open bar and BBQ after play. It is believed that more new members will come through these events. The latest event will be on Sunday 14th December.

We have also had other organisations (historical society and physiotherapy organisation) ask to come along for a supervised fun event. The above events will bring in additional and welcome money for the club.

Another member, with the main responsibility of maintaining our court, has put in a lot of effort this year and has enlisted the assistance of a specialist in raising the standard of court through scarifying, spraying for beetle, ants and fungus and top dressing.

The subject of being limited to one A-court is often raised and being a part of the Bowling Club makes the prospect of us possibly moving to another venue complicated.

2025 has been a very successful year for the club.

Eaglehawk Croquet Club 2025 report.

Eaglehawk currently has 34 members many of whom play 2, 3 + times a week. Golf Croquet is played Wednesdays (club comp) & Saturdays which includes 4 free come and try days which has resulted in a number of new members. Snake in the grass is played on Mondays and proved very popular. During daylight saving twilight gc is also played on Tuesdays.

Members regularly visit other clubs for their social days and also participate in a 6 week pennant competition .

Club is in good financial position & recently purchased a new roller for courts. Weeds are an ongoing problem and courts will be scarified and worked on during holiday break. Members are always willing to pitch in. Club has applied for soil testing through croquet vic and hopefully will receive valuable information to further improve courts.

It was a busy year with 27 school group sessions including 3 secondary colleges ranging from 1 session per week for 2 weeks to 2 sessions per week for 6 weeks. A local primary school also came for 1 day. 4 coaches plus quite a few other members all with WWCC covered the sessions which have been a good source of revenue for club. 2 secondary colleges have already booked in for sessions in 2026.

A fortnightly session ran throughout year for “ Access all Abilities “ group plus their carers. These loved the sessions and showed noticeable improvement. So keen were they that they bought a mini croquet set for use indoors.

The local Probus club had their Xmas breakup at E/H club and enjoyed a game of golf croquet with members followed by a lovely spread of savoury and sweet fingerfood, resulting in the club also gaining a couple of new members.

Constitution Review Working Group Report to Council

1. Context

The Constitution Review Working Group conducted an informal survey of Council members to assess responses to the governance experiment currently under way, where Committee of Management (CoM) meetings are in abeyance, and Council meets monthly.

The responses were favourable, with only one respondent taking the view that they had not signed up for monthly meetings when agreeing to regional representation, while seven felt the monthly arrangement works well.

3. Working Group Assessment

The Working Group (WG) is of the view that the experimental arrangement has been a success, meeting the objectives of reducing double handling and ambiguity while empowering Council enabling it to better fulfill its governance functions.

4. Points for Discussion

(a) Constitution

Adoption of the monthly Council meeting format, with abolition of a separate CoM, The WG to consider appropriate enabling changes to the constitution and to focus on the second constitutional review priority, the Federation of Regions structure, and the third priority, "good housekeeping" rationalisation of the Constitution.

(b) Meeting protocol

- Monthly Council meetings could be changed to evening times (straw poll on preferred start time 6:30 or 7:30 pm)
- Two annual face-to-face meetings to be retained
- Current agenda management practices to be retained and refined

Sport Integrity Australia (SIA) and Sport and Recreation Victoria (SRV) Australia Roadshow in Victoria - Tuesday, 2/12/25 - to update the Victorian sport sector on developments and trends relating to the National Integrity Framework.

Points covered:-

- ✓ Integrity management in sport has evolved significantly in the last decade from a 'reactionary' position to essential function; NIF - currently reviewing policy. Final Antidoping Policy has been released. WADA has released a new list of substances.
- ✓ SIA has a range of supports to assist with implementation of National Integrity Framework (NIF) including education, capability building programs, grants, advice, webinars and education/e-learning; SIA started - Youth Athlete Reference Group - voice of child (6) survey will be completed by February 2026 and project 'Sport is for EveryBody' - addressing body positivity.
- ✓ The importance of consistency between culture and policies/process in demonstrating commitment to integrity;
- ✓ Approaching complaints should be underpinned by fairness, impartiality, proportionality, clear communications and strong record-keeping; Complaint Management Support; SIA has covered 105 cases/investigations this year - still dealing with unreasonable complaints but numbers have diminished.
- ✓ Consider opportunities to connect and collaborate with other sports and jurisdictions who are facing similar risks;
- ✓ Prioritise preventative action to address potential 'passive permission' of unacceptable behaviours, including those that might seem innocuous but lay the foundation for escalation;
- ✓ Seek to address issues at the lowest/local level to mitigate and minimise potential risks including escalation;

Q: Can you assess in Complaints Management whether complainants are happy with the outcomes or is the process just too complicated. (Thank you, Sarina)

A: To date, there has not been research to quantify but anecdotally, in general, complainants have not been happy.

A key takeaway from panel - Clubs not only have policies and oversight but also create culture.

I found the presentation informative and educative and I would highly recommend a Croquet Victoria representative attending all similar events.

I have provided feedback to the organisers on the content and event.

BACKGROUND

In 2017 Croquet Victoria was funded to develop a ten year plan for croquet infrastructure across the State. All clubs provided base information on their facilities.

When the project report was submitted, Council decided to request clubs to update their information annually, to ensure that current data would be available for planning into the future.

Clubs have been given access to their responses, and each January they have been asked to update them.

Over time, the survey has been extended to include questions about aspects of club activity other than infrastructure. Currently it also includes questions about use of social media; access for players with a disability; and engagement with schools.

CURRENT SITUATION

The Strategic Plan Implementation Sub-Committee has carriage of the survey and annually reviews the questions that are included.

Data from the survey have been used to update the Council Manual when it is revised each June.

Council was advised in September that Croquet Australia had requested access to the responses to the survey. It was agreed that this had not been flagged to clubs and could be seen as intrusive.

Accordingly, members of the Strategic Plan Implementation Sub-Committee have undertaken to analyse the survey responses. Our report is attached.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended

1. that Council be provided with an annual summary of the club survey data in June each year
2. that this report be forwarded to Croquet Australia in response to their request for data from the survey.

Clubs were invited to respond to this survey in January 2025. All bar two clubs responded by June 2025, and the two missing clubs responded in 2024. These two clubs have been included, using their 2024 data.

1. Demographics

Gender

66% women, 33% men. Four players identify as Other.

All clubs answered this question.

Nearly 90% of members are over 65.




6. Comments

All clubs provided at least some comments in relation to the open-ended questions at the end of the survey. Many commented on more than one topic in response to the same question, so the total number of comments differs from the number of clubs.

Clubs interpreted the open-ended questions in a variety of ways. The following analysis summarises the topics which came up in response to each question and counts up answers which were similar.

Positives in past year

Most comments focused on matters to do with members: membership (35), recruitment strategies (22), competitive play (16), club morale (14) and player development (11). There were also 36 comments on facilities, and 66 comments on media (analysed separately).

Media mentions in past year

Most comments focused on local print media (61) and social media (32). There were also 7 comments on TV and radio mentions, and 6 comments on other publicity strategies.

Threats to the club's existence

Four clubs did not respond to this question, one club said it was not applicable, and 35 said there were no threats.

Threats identified by the other 46 clubs included falling membership (30), lack of appropriate facilities (14) and lack of leaders (10).

Financial viability

Three clubs said they have concerns about their financial viability. While most clubs responded positively (60 said they were not concerned about their financial viability) many noted that generating income to meet costs is an ongoing effort. The high cost of lawn maintenance was noted by several clubs.

Courts and clubhouse adequate to demand?

A majority of clubs said both their courts and clubhouse were adequate to meet current demand.

Other comments, including the impact of COVID?

30 clubs raised no issues.

27 replies appeared to be correcting or confirming factual information held by Croquet Victoria on club ownership (21 LGA, 3 private, 3 other bodies). These replies will be referred to the webmaster so the database can be corrected.

17 clubs commented on the continuing impact of COVID.

23 raised a variety of other issues.
